



May 9th, 2024 City of Coral Gables Coral Gables Country Club

MDCLC President and **Mayor Rodney Harris**, City of Miami Gardens commenced the meeting by expressing gratitude to all attendees for being present at his last meeting as 69th President of the league. He thanked everyone for being part of the League and for their continuous efforts. **President Harris** called the meeting to order at 7:41 P.M.

President Harris welcomed MDCLC Board Member Commissioner Walter Thompson, City of Florida City to conduct the invocation. President Harris then led us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

President Harris asked for a motion to approve the minutes and consent the agenda. The motion passed by a unanimous vote.

Each year, the League's President has the opportunity to recognize individuals for their strong commitment and dedication to the League at their final meeting. **President Harris** expressed his gratitude to everyone, emphasizing that each person's efforts this year are greatly appreciated. dedication and support in the League. **President Harris** mentioned that **Mr. Trainer** is known throughout south Florida for his commitment in public service and for promoting our cities. Mr. Trainer was unable to attend this evening's meeting but will be given the award at a later date.

MDCLC First Vice President and Mayor Karyn Cunningham, Palmetto Bay recognized Dade County Federal Credit Union as the Associate Member spotlight for the evening. President and CEO George Joseph, along with Executive Vice President Annie Wilkinson, were invited to the podium to share insights about their organization. Mr. Joseph highlighted that Dade County Federal Credit Union has been a cornerstone of the Miami-Dade community for over 80 years. Originally serving only county employees, the credit union has grown into a robust financial institution with over \$900 million in loans and a wide array of services catering to the entire community. Their mission is to empower members by helping them achieve their financial goals. One of their significant achievements is the Rise Miami-Dade Loan program, which has provided essential financial support to over a thousand small businesses in Miami-Dade County, demonstrating their commitment to economic development and entrepreneurial opportunities. Additionally, they introduced the Home Purchasing Assistance (HPA) Program, aimed at making homeownership more accessible to first-time buyers in Miami-Dade and Broward Counties. This program offers eligible members up to \$100,000 or 20% of the purchase price, whichever is lower, for down payment and closing cost assistance to buy their primary residence. Looking ahead, Dade County Federal envisions a future where financial inclusion is universal, providing all Miami-Dade citizens with the resources needed to thrive and ensuring the continued prosperity of the community.

MDCLC Executive Director Richard Kuper expressed his gratitude to President Harris for his dedicated service as the 69th President of the League. He then reminded everyone about the upcoming 70th Annual Gala Celebration, scheduled for June 8, 2024, at the Loews Hotel in Coral Gables. He informed the attendees that space was limited, and that sponsorships and tickets were selling fast. Designated legalads.miamidade.gov as the publicly accessible website for legal advertisements.


Developed a form Interlocal Agreement (ILA) for use by the County and other local governments that wish to utilize this website to publish legal advertisements and public notices.


Established a process for municipal partners to post their own legal notices using the County's Content Management System (CMS).

RESOLUTION NO. 24 - 2008

A RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF MIAMI LAKES, FLORIDA SEEKING SUPPORT FROM THE FLORIDA AND MIAMI-DADE COUNTY LEAGUE OF CITIES IN ORDER TO ADVOCATE FOR ROCK MINE BLASTING LEGISLATIVE REFORM; PROVIDING FOR INSTRUCTIONS TO THE CLERK; PROVIDING FOR INCORPORATION OF RECITALS; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Town of Miami Lakes (the "Town") residents and business owners have been harmed by the negative effects of rock-mine blasting; and

WHEREAS, in the past few years there have been several proposed legislations that would regulate blast intensity without causing a significant economic impact on the rock-mining companies' ability to conduct their business; and

WHEREAS, the negative effects of blasting include deterioration and damage to real property; and

WHEREAS, currently the law of the State of Florida curtails the remedies available to homeowners, and the venue in which homeowners' grievances can be heard; and

WHEREAS, current regulation of rock-mine blasting activity has been pre-empted by the State of Florida, limiting the ability of local county and city governments to address and curtail the effects of blasting within their respective jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, under Florida law, the Florida State Fire Marshal has the sole and exclusive authority to adopt standards, limits, and regulations on rock-mine blasting activities, including, without limitation, the authority to set limits on ground vibration; and

WHEREAS, rock-mine blasting damage has been experienced beyond the Town's boundaries, and has impacted neighboring municipalities including, without limitation, the cities of Hialeah, Hialeah Gardens, Homestead, Miramar, Miami Gardens, Sweetwater, and Medley, as well as unincorporated areas of Miami-Dade County, Broward County, Lee County, and Collier County; and

WHEREAS, the Town seeks the support and resources of the Florida and Miami-Dade County League of Cities, respectively, to join us in seeking meaningful legislative reform from their respective legislative delegations as well as action by the State Fire Marshal in order to curtail the effects of rock-mine blasting.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL FOR THE TOWN OF MIAMI LAKES, FLORIDA, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Recitals. The foregoing recitals are true and correct and are incorporated herein by reference.

Section 2. Urging the Florida and Miami-Dade County League of Cities, respectively, to Advocate for Meaningful Legislative Reform. The Town Council of Miami Lakes urges the Florida and Miami-Dade County League of Cities, respectively, to join in advocating for legislative reform of rock-mining activity in order to allow for greater relief to those affected, to provide local governments with the ability to regulate rock-mining activity within their respective jurisdictions, and to provide those affected with greater access to judicial courts in order to address their grievances.

Section 3. Urging the Florida and Miami-Dade County League of Cities, respectively, to Advocate for Meaningful Action by Florida State Fire Marshal. The Town Council of Miami Lakes further urges the Florida and Miami-Dade County League of Cities, respectively, to join in advocating for Florida's State Fire Marshal to provide immediate relief to residents affected by rock-mine blasting by exercising its authority under Florida law to amend Rule 69A-2.024 (as adopted as of the Effective Date of this Resolution) to provide that blasting within one (1) mile of an urban development shall not exceed a peak particle velocity of more than 0.15 inches per second.

<u>Section 4.</u> <u>Instructions to the Town Clerk.</u> The Town Clerk is instructed to submit a copy of this resolution to the Florida and the Miami-Dade County League of Cities, respectively.

Section 5. Effective Date. This Resolution shall be effective immediately upon adoption.

Passed and adopted this 9th day of July 2024.

The rock-mining industry is essential for Florida's economy and we do not wish to see it terminated. However, the destruction of our properties cannot not be allowed to continue. With constant seismic activity resulting in millions of dollars in damages and repairs to homes and businesses and recent deadly incidents such as the collapse of the condominium tower in Surfside, many now live in fear for their lives in their own homes.







Limerock extraction in South Florida consists of drilling 84' into the earth and filling with explosives. Once the explosives are detonated, the limerock falls into the water pit. The broken limerock is then removed by a large dragline and brought to the surface. The water seen is part of the Biscayne Aquifer that makes up our area. It is known that water carries energy waves great distances. This is the reason why we are feeling the energy waves from the explosions that are destroying our properties.



The Florida Chief Financial Office/State Fire Marshal oversees the regulation of blasting within the State. They have established the legal limit in Florida of the energy wave generated by blasting as to 0.5in/sec Peak Particle Velocity (PPV) and air blast cannot exceed 133 decibels. However, if you feel the synthetic earthquake, SO DOES YOUR HOME! The State has created a website to file your complaint and monitor the blasts.

Recently, the State of Florida created the MiamiDade Pilot Program to acquire data of what we are experiencing. Every time you feel a blast, PLEASE SUBMIT YOUR COMPLAINT! The complaints are being collected as data, along with each blast information. The intent is to have the ability to create proper regulation to co-exist with the industry.












Seismic damage is specific. It can be seen in our homes and structures throughout the area. It does not matter the age.

Can you tell the difference between these two homes? One is 30 years old at the time of the photo, the other is 2 years of age.



Liquefaction is a known phenomenon when energy is introduced into saturated soils. Soil substantially loses strength and stiffness in response to an applied stress such as shaking during an earthquake or other sudden change in stress condition, in which material that is ordinarily a solid behaves like a liquid.








Results and data of the MiamiDade Pilot Program can be followed via its website. The complaints submitted are serving as statistical data. Complaints are being logged and from the amount complaints received, the State laid out a placement map of seismographs. These machines are placed throughout the County. There are currently 23 devices in operation. Yellow triangles are monitoring device locations and the blue dots are complaints received.






